Security Committee Security Patrol Proposal

As a result of the pandemic and related social issues, there has been an uptick of crime. Our neighborhood is no different. As a result, neighbors got together and put together a proposal for security patrols in East Montrose. The East Montrose boundaries are Fairview – Montrose – West Gray - Genesee.

Patrol Option Recommendation

SEAL Patrol (private security company) 40 hours/week (tentatively Wednesday – Sunday evenings from 10pm – 6am) Cost = \$37/hour x 40 hours/week x 52 weeks = \$76,960 East Montrose Civic Association is a 501 c4 non-profit, meaning we don't have to pay sales tax. Commencing January 1, 2022 or as soon as we get enough members to

cover a contract period.

Note - Another option is the Harris County Constable patrol. It is a bit more costly and less flexible but worthy of discussion before the October 2022 application deadline.

Membership Costs

Membership would be ~\$365/year if we can get 211 members (less if we can get more).

This is only \$1/day (less than a cup of coffee).

Members receive a hotline number to call as well as a yard sign indicating your participation. We can also list members on the EMCA website.

There was also a spirited discussion on GEM (Greater East Montrose) plans to hire security patrol for our neighborhood with a total consensus from members of the increased crime problem in East Montrose and surrounding areas and the need for more security.



Got my COVID booster and flu vaccine in late December at the Walgreens on W. Gray at Woodhead. Made the appointment online ... easy-peasy. Quick(ish) in-and-out at the store, and really upbeat, helpful, personal service. No side effects except a mildly tender injection point. No charge for either, either. (subject to your individual circumstances) Whew! A load off my mind!

Earlier sunsets and warmer winter temperatures mean that more people are out and about after dark. Please know that it's extremely difficult for motorists to see pedestrians, pets, bicyclists, and skateboarders (among many other mobile entities) in the dark.

Folks – PLEASE consider following these safety tips:

- `Wear light-colored clothing
- `Wear reflective clothing, such as a safety vest
- `Put reflective tape on your clothing, shoes, and pets' collar or harness
- `Glow-in-the-dark accessories are highly visible, too.
- `Even better are lights use flashlights, headlamps, light-up gear to make yourself visible to car drivers
- `Pets need protection, too ... outfit your pooch or outdoor cat with any / all of the above safety elements

In addition, when you're out after dark, don't count on the automobile drivers being able to see you. Be proactive. Wear clothing that makes you visible. But also stay safely on sidewalks, instead of walking or bicycling in the street. Keep alert for vehicular traffic – look all ways before crossing a street. And keep your eyes off the phone and on your surroundings.

When the Dollar Tree store opened in the River Oaks Shopping Center some years back, I scoffed, thinking, "This is River Oaks and gentrifying Montrose – no one would deign to be caught dead in a budget store with a puny dollar price tag." I presumed that merchandise would be limited to cheap, useless "made-in-Japan" knick-knacks. After all, according to one report I read, "Dollar stores tend to flourish in areas where residents are making below the median income and living at high rates of poverty. They also tend to pop up in areas where residents have lower levels of education, higher rates of smoking and obesity. Dollar stores are also more common in communities with higher crime rates."

Boy, was I wrong! This store had throngs of customers (local customers!) from its first opening day! It stayed packed with shoppers even through years of a messy air conditioning system dripping onto the sales floor. Today the wet floor is a thing of the past, and the new manager, Warren, is a modest but super-effective business genius. You'll find the store is a stalwart of holiday staples, greeting cards are 15% the price of most, name-brand (Super Glue!, VO5 shampoo!, Campbells!) for cheap, and in the candy aisle I once was privy to a couple raving over the delights of "retro" childhood favorites like Milk Duds, Swizzlers, and Fiddle Faddle.

Well, fast forward eight years or whatever it's been, and the store is going stronger than ever. BUT ... Dollar Tree is raising its prices. By 25c an item. Interestingly enough, just yesterday I read an on-line article about just this – dollar stores across the country are forced to raise their prices. Factor in here the pandemic and just plain old annual inflation, plus this will enable the sales of items that grew too expensive for the store to sell profitably at \$1. Goodie! Maybe they'll soon start re-stocking my fave instant hash browns and cell phone charger. Happy savings shopping!



In addition, in 2100 Stanford, take a look at the PAVEMENT. Colored laser lights projected onto the side of the building reflect off and land in the street, where they dance around the asphalt! Stand there long enough, and you'll see that when any two lights happen to collide, they explode like fireworks. When four of them collide, you get a bigger explosion. Certain impacts cause the whole outfit to break into squares of dots - that disappear in a blink! It's mesmerizing! Go see it for yourself. The funnest spot is right in the street, smack in the midst of the twirling lights.
