## Hurricane Preparedness

Hurricane safety is paramount, and as we get into the season, it is vital that everyone stay safe and prepared for any severe storms that come this way. Houston gets on average, 14 named storms per year with 7 becoming hurricanes. Most activity takes place towards the end of summer, so this is a great time to begin preparing. Here are some tips to get you started with storm safety.

1. Sign up for storm alerts from FEMA or Harris County's Ready Harris Alerts program. The City of Houston also sends out emergency texts, which you can sign up for if you don't receive those.

2. If you need to evacuate, have a plan already in place for where you will be headed.

3. Speaking of evacuations, have a Go Kit ready with 7-10 days of supplies. Clothing, cash, medications and first aid supplies, flash-lights/lanterns with extra batteries, charging cables and portable chargers, toiletries, nonperishable food items, and water should all be packed and ready. If you have children and/or pets, don't forget their essentials.

4. Protect your home! Things you can do now include checking for any leaks, taking care of repairs you've put off. Decluttering drains and gutters. Day of, you want to secure outdoor items or bring them indoors. If there is possibility of flying debris, consider board your windows. This would require you to have supplies on hand to board up with. Move your car(s) to an indoor location if its typically kept outside.

5. If you are not evacuating, and instead sheltering at home, plan for power outages or water boil alerts. Keep a bathtub filled with water, source a generator if possible. If the power goes out, you have about 4 hours before food spoilage in a refrigerator, and 48 hours for frozen items BUT ONLY IF YOU KEEP THEM CLOSED.

6. Finally, check in on neighbors, friends, and family in the area!

Hope everyone and your homes all stay safe this storm season. Preparing now will prevent additional panic later—your future self will thank you!

## **Recipe of the Month**

We are going Greek this month with some delicious Greek Chicken Meatballs in a Creamy Tomato Orzo. Perfect for using up those summer seasonals. Recipe by Tieghan Gerard

### Ingredients

1 ½ Ib ground chicken, pork, or turkey
½ cup grated parmesan cheese
1shallot, chopped
8 clove garlic, 2 chopped, 6 whole
¼ cup fresh oregano, chopped
2 tsp sweet or regular paprika
1 tbsp balsamic vinegar
kosher salt and black pepper
chili flakes

- 2 tbsp extra virgin olive oil
- 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup cherry tomatoes
- 1 cup dry white wine
- 2 cup dry orzo pasta
- 1/2 cup heavy cream or whole milk
- 6 tbsp salted butter
- 1 sprig rosemary
- 4 sprigs fresh thyme
- 1/2 cup crumbled feta
- fresh basil and dill, for serving

### Instructions:

1. Add the chicken, parmesan, shallot, 2 chopped cloves of garlic, oregano, paprika, and balsamic vinegar to a bowl. Season with salt, pepper, and chili flakes. Mix to combine. Coat your hands with oil, and roll the meat into tablespoon-size balls (will make 15-16 meatballs). Drizzle with olive oil and place the meatballs in the bowl of your crockpot.

Add the tomatoes. Pour over the wine and 1/2 cup water. Add the whole garlic cloves. Cover and cook on low for 3-4 hours or on high for 1-2 hours.
 Preheat the broiler to high. Remove the meatballs and garlic from the slow cooker and place on a baking sheet.

4. Crank the heat on the slow cooker to high. Stir in the orzo, and 1 cup water. Cover and cook 20-30 minutes, or until the orzo is al dente. If the orzo needs more liquid, add additional water. Stir in the milk/cream.

5. Arrange the butter, rosemary, and thyme, around the meatballs and garlic, then broil for 1-3 minutes, until crisp. Peel away the garlic skin, then chop and mix with the butter and herbs on the sheet pan. Toss the meatballs in the butter.

6. Serve the meatballs over the orzo with feta cheese, fresh basil, and dill.
