

against the Detroit Tigers at Minute Maid Park on Monday, August 19th.






Our "Yard of the Season" homeowner winners are the Whitakers, whose home is 2119 Hopkins. They chose East Montrose for our neighborhood's diversity — the diverse ages of residents (from empty nesters to young families with children), and the mixture of types of properties in the area. The walking distance to downtown for Mike's chemical engineering job, and the proximity to one of their daughter's family in Sutton Square were important. Karen is a retired high school guidance counselor, who is an avid snow skier and hiker, and enjoys creating stained glass and mosaic pieces. Enjoying our area restaurants, parks, and art scene are high on the Whitakers' list, as is spending time with their daughter who is local, another daughter and three grandchildren in Washington, DC, and their son in Breckenridge, Colorado.

Ravenscourt Landscaping in the Heights designed the hardscape of the Whitakers' home. The design was to include a pergola as an outside room, complete with curtains for shade. Also, Karen wanted a fountain as a soothing sound, as well as to mitigate the sound of the AC units. Star jasmine on the fence provides some privacy, but areas without that make it easy to chat with neighbors as they walk by.

It took several years for the Whitakers to understand that what grows well in the summer in the north, just burns up in Houston. Many of the plants in the garden are tropical, and Karen likes to experiment with

new plants in the potted plant area. Their sunny front porch provides a perfect place for color and herbs. The biggest challenge is working around the three live oak trees along the sidewalk. The shade and heat relief that the trees provide also limit the choice of plantings. Despite a drip watering system, you will see Karen out there with her watering can, enjoying puttering around. Former EMCA resident, Pete Gershon, recently wrote a book, *Collision: The Contemporary Art Scene in Houston 1972-1985*. Gershon continues his exploration of the Houston Art Scene to curate a show at the Glassell School opening September 6: *Prints and Ceramics from Little Egypt Enterprises and Related Studios*.

Pete Gershon writes: "Decades later, Little Egypt's collected output is deserving of greater recognition as one of the city's most significant, imaginative and longstanding collaborative art projects."

Little Egypt Enterprises was a collaborative print studio where artists worked with Master Printers and Craftspersons to create original lithographs, etchings, serigraphs and ceramics, usually in editions of 5-50. David Folkman, Master Printer and founder, came to Houston in 1974 and left in 1990. This writer became etching printer at Little Egypt in 1980 and continued working collaboratively with artists through the mid 2000's at Cerling Etching Studio and Tembo/Cerling Collaboratives, the outgrowths of Little Egypt Enterprises.

Folkman, founder of Little Egypt, also encouraged artists to show their work in a small space used as a gallery. Some of you may remember the gallery openings and parties when Little Egypt was located at the corner of West Gray and Waugh. Many important artists had their first showing at Little Egypt's gallery and the endless loop video by Andy Mann, now seen daily at the Art Car Museum, was first shown in Houston at Little Egypt.
