My Life In Montrose-50 Years!... by Annette M. Zinn

Thinking back to 1972...that was when my life in Montrose started. Tim Zinn had just exited from the U.S. Navy (San Diego)--we were dirt-poor-and, we were moving back to Texas (baby in tow)! We looked like hippies...lived like hippies...acted like hippies (but didn't do drugs)—so I guess we were hippies--Not sure that we met the strict definition! At any rate we couldn't find a place to live—and ended up on California Street (California Street Apartments) since it was the most we could afford—at that time it was a one bedroom roach and rat infested property! Our treat was to walk to Felix's Mexican Restaurant on Friday night on Westheimer off Montrose (now closed). Thereafter we managed to move to Ridgewood Street parallel to Dunlavy. It was a nice-brick, two-story with hardwood floors and lots of windows. We found Esperanza the Outdoor School for Tara (first located on Hawthorne Street-now closed). We also were involved in KPFT, listener-supported radio (considered a hippie radio station). As life would have it...I graduated from U of H and Tim and I separated— I stayed on Ridgewood but moved next door to the downstairs apartment (same landlordfirst building now a townhouse). At some point I realized I needed to forget about anthropology graduate school and needed to figure out how to pay rent/bills. I got accepted into the masters program University of Texas School of Public Health-doors started opening (later I graduated law school and began Ph.D.—all out of the Ridgewood house!). I made some really close friends on Ridgewood---for the most part they lived within a 2-house radius of my place—of note, Dr. Red Duke's daughter and two Silvia Garcia neighbors who were roommates—one now Congresswoman! We were all in school and struggling but had a great time-it was like the Big Chill!

I was the only single parent in the group—my theme song was Gloria Gaynor's "I Will Survive." When Tara was at her dad's I hit all the disco bars in Montrose (now closed except for Numbers)—sure was fun! Later we would go to the House of Pies on Kirby, sleep for a few hours, shower and go to school/work the next day. We always had lots of trouble in the neighborhood—there were drug dealers, prostitutes, peeping toms, and just lots of colorful characters mixed in with struggling students and artists! We were broken into many timesand we even think our house was haunted! Also, we were also scared of the HL&P power plant—it buzzed all the time and still does. What is now the city's multi-service center on W. Gray was a weed lot across from our Ridgewood house. There was a Shipley Donut at Dunlavy (now closed) and W. Gray—surrounded by another weed lot. What is now Kroger used to be Weingarten's. The River Oaks Theatre (now closing) was always there! In those days the theatre had a full balcony (no bar) and published a 3-month calendar of wonderful films—Harold and Maude was always a party!—later it was Rocky Horror and so many other wonderful films with themes...e.g., Thursday nights was Humphrey Bogart or a given week vintage science fiction. We have so many wonderful memories of Ridgewood Street—including our annual Halloween parties--we passed out flyers to everyone we knew or met.

There was a lot of work to be done—and in 2007 my little bungalow was selected to be on the homes' tour!—In 2018 our San Jacinto High School (now HCC) Class of 1968 reunion committee met to plan our 50th reunion—I couldn't believe how many stories there were about our classmates who lived in Montrose--and at 802 Peden!

Looking back, things have really changed--more and more bungalows have been torn down and townhouses and other buildings have popped up. In fact, it sometimes feels like I live in the suburbs--lots of stores, restaurants and businesses have added another layer to the pre-existing charm of years past. I am so lucky that I've experienced these 50 years in Montrose!
