

I had an unexpected Sunday afternoon off work. It was sunny and warm, so I hopped on my bike and took a ride down Stanford from East Montrose to Hermann Park.

Observations. a.k.a Things You Encounter Only In Montrose:

Throng of people flocking to George and the Eagle, and patios in full swing with conversation and friendship.

More throngs of people, using their Sunday afternoon to do wash at the Stanford Laundromat. Still without water a month after the freeze, I've been thinking of giving the place a try. So I stepped in and walked around to check the place out. The management eyed me suspiciously, and didn't exactly give me a warm reception, even when I explained that I might be bringing my laundry the next day. "Do you provide change, so we can feed the coin-operated machines?" "Yes, we have change for customers. For CUSTOMERS ONLY." Side note: I had an equally frosty experience when I used the Downtown Washateria on Tuam a few years ago. Maybe listening to those machines whirring all day long breeds a hostile attitude??

So I leave negativity behind and get back into the sunshine, riding south. On the right, about 15' of sidewalk blocked by tables covered with white cloths, and scores of people. A rummage sale? I approached hopefully. Turns out it was a party. Maybe someone's birthday. Most everything was light colored – white or cream, and most of the attendees were women. There were plates and glasses on the tables. This was outside one of those long, low apartment complexes from the '70's, and there probably were no patios or common areas. So the sunny sidewalk served the purpose!

Cruising to the 4000 block of Stanford, I heard screeching and blaring. Some jerk forcing his idea of music on his neighbors, I groused. But as I got closer, the notes rearranged themselves, and suddenly I was hearing music – symphonic music! In the parking lot across from the HSPVA was a group of teenagers. Seven kids fanned out in a socially-distanced semi-circle, with an eighth, a gal, the conductor, in the center facing them. The musicians all were playing flutes. Everyone seemed to be playing a different part, and the music floating from the parking lot was lovely. I don't know if they minded the audience, but I stood there a while listening.

Where Stanford dead-ends into Hwy 59, my route jogs right to Montrose. On an empty lot before the bridge were three gals. One was holding a large disk - one of those gizmos that reflects and diffuses light. They must have been taking photographs. Graduation pictures, I imagined. With all the foliage dead and brown from the freeze, there really wasn't any attractive backdrop. Oh, well – they're young. That means they know how to Photoshop in something pretty.

Pedaling on down to Hermann Park. Here there IS beautiful green scenery, and plenty of it, along with the Mecom Fountain, the rotunda, and Sam Houston on his horse. Wonderful backdrops for photographs. On any given weekend day, you will see one of my favorite sights – the special event portrait sessions. Bride and groom. Graduates. Babies and children. And always the pretty teen girls decked out for their quinceaneras. So young to be the center of so much attention! And the dresses are exquisite! On this ride, I saw two girls. One had nabbed the prime spot inside the white columns of the rotunda. One in purple and one in charcoal. Both had formal bodices, and long flouncing skirts. The purple dress sported light flowers down the side and bottom, and the darker one had black decorations. Both girls were radiant - and seemed quite comfortable there in the spotlight.

Curbside Recycling

Residents who receive SWMD Collection Services are provided with a large, 96-gallon green recycling bin. Recycling is collected every other week on the same day as your garbage is collected. Check your collection schedule [here](#).



Recycling right is just as important as recycling more. Contamination harms the program by making it hard to recover clean recyclables at the sorting center. To help protect the curbside recycling program, remember to keep it clean and when in doubt, throw it out.

See the images and list below for what to and what not to put in your recycling cart. Remember most recyclables are packaging items from products found in the kitchen, bath and laundry of your home. All recycling items must be empty and clean before placing in the recycling bin. Place items loose into the cart - do not bag recycling.

YES! Put these in your recycling cart.



- Metal and Cans: Aluminum and Tin Cans. Examples include soup cans, vegetable cans, fruit cans, coffee cans (emptied and rinsed)
- Cartons: Both gable top and shelf-stable food and beverage cartons. Examples include milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons, soy milk/alternative milk cartons (emptied and rinsed)
- Glass: Bottles, jugs and jars only (emptied and rinsed)
- Paper: Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, office paper
- Cardboard: Cardboard and cereal boxes (emptied of packing materials and flattened)
- Plastic: Bottles, tubs and jugs #1 - 5 and 7. Examples include water and soda bottles, milk jugs, yogurt cups, margarine tubs, detergent bottles, shampoo bottles. (emptied and rinsed)

NO! DO NOT put these in your recycling cart.



Do NOT put the following in your GREEN RECYCLING container: Batteries/Electronics; Shredded Paper; Tangles (cords, hoses, wires, clothing); Food/Liquids; Trash and Bagged Recycling; Furniture and Household Goods; Scrap Wood and Scrap Metal (NO Helium Tanks); Yard Waste.

 Chemicals and hot ashes cause truck fires.

Placing Your Bin

HOW TO POSITION YOUR CARTS CORRECTLY

- 1** Allow 3 feet between carts and structures such as mail boxes, lamp posts and 5 feet from cars
- 2** Face the metal bar toward the street
- 3** Make sure the lid is closed

Do not place cart underneath low, overhanging tree limbs or utility lines
