Safety in East Montrose

We had a very informative meeting on Tuesday, May 18th. We had several of our own presenting video of some of the transgressions that we are seeing in the neighborhood, especially closer to the Fairview corridor. Additionally, we had two guests, Sergeant Wall from the Houston Police Department and Jack Valinski from the Mayor's Office.

Some of the suggestions we were given are to do the following:

• If you are experiencing a large number of incidents, please place an Alert Slip with HPD. This can help increase police "drivebys" in the area. To place an alert slip, go to: <u>Houston Police Department - Alert Slip (houstontx.gov)</u>

- Provide any video's that you feel might be helpful to the police department
- Obtain Permit Parking for your street with the City of Houston
- Watch out for your neighbors

We also discussed putting together a HPD Citizen Patrol Volunteer Program which would mean getting 8 volunteers from EMCA who would drive and patrol the neighborhood at periods of time.

Several years ago, we had tried to get a constable unit in this neighborhood. For everyone's reference this would mean having a constable who would patrol our neighborhood. The cost for a constable is around \$80,000/annually. We had united with Cherry-hurst and WAMM to pay for a constable and we needed 50 homes to contribute around \$400 a year. Unfortunately, we did not have enough participation to support this.

Have you been wondering what the Nuro car is doing in the neighborhood....you are not alone. Inquiring minds reached out. Below is information from a flyer they provided.

A little bit about us...

We're a Texas registered company of more than 200 people who believe that great technology should benefit everyone. We spend every day designing products that address

people's real needs; delivering convenience - safely and affordably.

What did I just see?

We're doing a small pilot of autonomous (self-driving) vehicles that are designed to move goods - not people. For trips to the pharmacy, a grocery run, or a last minute flower delivery, vehicles like this might one day allow you to stay home and let your errands come to you. What's the vehicle doing right now?

Any number of things! It might be using our advanced technology to map the roads in minute detail. It may be testing how the technology senses and reacts to a new environment. Or, it might be using those tools to drive autonomously - with specially

Yet another mid-rise coming, jamming our streets with commuters and overtaxing our sewer and water and electric systems...

After seven years, construction has re-begun on West Dallas at Montrose, next to (on top of) Magnolia Cemetery. There is plenty of on-line chatter about 'stolen' property, disrespected graves, ghosts, and hauntings. I'll leave you to ferret that out for yourselves (hint: <u>Nextdoor</u> has a very long thread about this. But there are plenty of other news and opinion stories on-line).

But here's something that dates back to the first time they tried to build here, in 2014. The construction project burst into flames, a man's life was in immense and imminent peril, and he was saved – literally – within seconds from horrific tragedy. All caught on video. It's heart-stopping.

I remember this like it was yesterday, I can't stop thinking about the workman, and I watch the video a couple of times a year. <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=DwOFYzEpocQ</u> If you're reading this on-line, just click and watch.

If you are reading a paper copy, please take the time to type in and watch the video. This is not made-for-TV. This is a real life skin-of-the-teeth rescue – and it happened mere blocks from your home.



Wondering what this is?

The word from Houston Public Works, via Office of CM Abbie Kamin Chief of Staff Julia Retta, is that the large structure at 520 Westheimer is a Dynamic Message Sign (DMS). The DMS is part of a federal transportation grant the City received to install "intelligent transportation" infrastructure along major thoroughfares citywide. The DMS signs are managed by Houston TranStar and will provide real-time traffic information, in addition to amber alerts, flood and storm warning messages.

trained operators monitoring the systems to ensure it drives safely at all times.

How does Nuro protect my privacy?

During normal operation Nuro's vehicles see and hear the world around them just like any regular driver. As we map the roads, Nuro takes special efforts to protect the community's privacy, limiting sharing of recordings except for necessary driving and delivery operation tasks as well as protecting potentially sensitive details if they happen to be captured by the onboard equipment.

Storm Preparedness


The rain and storms we experienced this week reminded us that it's never too soon to prepare yourself and your family for weather events. June 1 marks the start of Hurricane Season. We encourage everyone to finalize your emergency plan, restock your supply kit, and stay informed in case of an emergency.

The City continues to invest heavily in flood mitigation and storm infrastructure. Council Member Kamin <u>spoke with FOX26 this week</u> to highlight several ongoing and recently completed projects in the Southwest part of District C, and to spotlight new action by City Council this week as they approved the engineering and design contract for the North Canal project. This project will reduce the risk of flooding where Buffalo and White Oak bayous meet near downtown. It will also benefit upstream areas in District C along the two bayous, including bridge and channel improvements at the Yale and Heights bridges over White Oak Bayou.

While Council Member Kamin is advocating for even more investments in flooding infrastructure for the District and our City, it's important for all of us to do our part in our own neighborhoods. Before a storm, there are steps you and your family can take to help with draining in your neighborhood. Please help clear drains before storms and call 311 if you see debris blocking ditches or roadways.

It's also critically important to make sure your flood insurance is current, even if your home is not located in the floodplain. Remember: just one inch of floodwater can cause up to \$25,000 in damage. If you are a



renter, you can still get flood insurance to cover things like furniture, clothes, television, computers, etc. If you need help finding flood insurance, you can go to www.FloodSmart.gov/find. The City also participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, which means you receive a 25% discount on flood insurance premiums if you are in the 100-year floodplain. If you purchase a new flood insurance policy, there is a mandatory 30-day waiting period before your policy takes effect – so do it now!





District C Updates

There's a lot happening in District C, from park openings and rescuing pets to free COVID vaccine clinics throughout the district (more on that in the last section below)!

There's a brand-new park in District C! On Saturday, Council Member Kamin joined city officials and neighborhood leaders to celebrate the transformation of a former parking lot at the Arabic Immersion Magnet School into a beautiful green space for students and community members to enjoy. Council Member Kamin contributed district council funds to purchase 6 oak trees that will provide shade for the children for years to come. The SPARK Park will open for public access starting this Saturday, May 22. For more information, visit www.firstmontrosecommons.org.



The District C Pet Pantry on May 8 provided food for 150 pets in partnership with the Montrose Center and the Houston Humane Society. Thanks to the wonderful volunteers and households who participated – Council Member Kamin is committed to ensuring families and pets can stay together.

Council Member Kamin also contributed district council funds to sponsor the transport of 70 BARC animals for adoption in other states, and this past week, District C staff joined Rescued Pets Movement to send some of them off to their forever homes

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
City Council approved the construction contract for the Garden Oaks and Shepherd Park (West) Drainage and Paving Project. This project brings much-needed flood mitigation and storm drainage improvements. Council Member Kamin worked to expand the project to include the 900 block of Wakefield, which experienced severe flooding during Tropical Storm Imelda. Public Works and the District C office will coordinate a public meeting about the project prior to construction beginning this fall.

Curbside Recycling

Residents who receive SWMD Collection Services are provided with a large, 96-gallon green recycling bin. Recycling is collected every other week on the same day as your garbage is collected. Check your collection schedule <u>here</u>.

Recycling right is just as important as recycling more. Contamination harms the program by making it hard to recover clean recyclables at the sorting center. To help protect the curbside recycling program, remember to keep it clean and when in doubt, throw it out.



See the images and list below for what to and what not to put in your recycling cart. Remember most recyclables are packaging items from products found in the kitchen, bath and laundry of your home. All recycling items must be empty and clean before placing in the recycling bin. Place items loose into the cart - do not bag recycling.

YES! Put these in your recycling cart.




- Metal and Cans: Aluminum and Tin Cans. Examples include soup cans, vegetable cans, fruit cans, coffee cans (emptied and rinsed)
- Cartons: Both gable top and shelf-stable food and beverage cartons. Examples include milk cartons, juice cartons, soup cartons, soy milk/alternative milk cartons (emptied and rinsed)
- Glass: Bottles, jugs and jars only (emptied and rinsed)
- Paper: Newspaper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, office paper
- Cardboard: Cardboard and cereal boxes (emptied of packing materials and flattened)
- Plastic: Bottles, tubs and jugs #1 5 and 7. Examples include water and soda bottles, milk jugs, yogurt cups, margarine tubs, detergent bottles, shampoo bottles. (emptied and rinsed)

NO! DO NOT put these in your recycling cart.




Do NOT put the following in your GREEN RECYCLING container: Batteries/Electronics; Shredded Paper; Tanglers (cords, hoses, wires, clothing); Food/Liquids; Trash and Bagged Recycling; Furniture and Household Goods; Scrap Wood and Scrap Metal (NO Helium Tanks); Yard Waste.
