2022 EAST MONTROSE HOME TOUR and ART WALK OCTOBER 8, 2022

The East Montrose Civic Association will host its 13th Biennial Home Tour and Art Walk on Saturday, October 8, from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. East Montrose, referred to as "the Heart of Houston," was platted in the early 1900s - back in the days when Houston's population numbered fewer than 300,000 and the GH&SA Railway ran down Montrose Blvd.

During the 1960s, East Montrose became a center for the counterculture and hippie communes, and in 1970, Anderson Fair, one of the oldest music venues in continuous operation in the United States, opened its doors.

Today a diverse mix of people and architecture, this pedestrian-friendly area exhibits a variety of architectural styles. These houses have original build dates ranging from the early 1900s to 2014. Tourgoers can get a glimpse of how the architecture has been transformed over the years, with results of unique renovations that are characteristic of this distinctive, eclectic neighborhood.

Also visit the working studios of nine local artists, all within comfortable strolling distance. You'll be invited in to the space where artists get their inspiration, and you'll see where and how their crafts come to life. The art walk is free of charge.

2022 EAST MONTROSE HOME TOUR and ART WALK OCTOBER 8, 2022

908 Welch: Start the tour at this turn-of-the century, four-square house which has been renovated with a modern flair by the current owner. A wide front porch, typical of the era, extends the full front width of the clapboard exterior. This gorgeous home retains its turn-of-the-century grandeur and the walls seem to whisper tales of carriages pulling up for evening rides, while art from local and international modern artists adorn the walls.

- ◆ 2020 Crocker: former home to Nell Stewart, who spent her first hundred years growing up in the home before recently selling to a young couple who are restoring it to its former glory. This is very much a work-in-progress, appealing to anyone who wants to see what goes into renovating an old home! Stewart was the local historian for years and regaled neighbors with stories as the neighborhood transitioned from the early 1900s, to the counterculture 70s, to present day. One tale regarding the First Pagan Church of Houston down the street "The children who lived there told fellow students they would turn them into black cats for lunch money".
- 2102 Stanford: Built in 2014 by a longtime resident of the neighborhood, this townhome was custom-designed to maximize views of the downtown Houston skyline while preserving a native pecan tree on the tight site. The resulting interiors are tall, airy and somewhat quirky spaces with spectacular daylight. Exterior is stucco and hardy board, interiors include 'gneiss' countertops, custom cabinetry, Viking appliances, and hardwood floors throughout. Unique floorplan includes a separate entry library/office/guestroom, expansive bonus room, and a fifth-floor deck with 300-degree views of the city.
- ♦ 301 Welch: Comprised of two shotgun shacks, built in 1915 and 1925, that were bolted together. Friends of the family bought the house for \$400 sometime around the 1930s. The house had an escape hatch in the floor of a linen cabinet possibly for bootleggers. The cabinet was discovered in 1991, when the house was moved to its current, location here in East Montrose from Jackson Street (next to St, Joseph's Hospital). In 2005, a three--story addition was added, which includes an apartment (designed to make the most of a small space) and an artist's studio.
- 802 Peden: Craftsman bungalow built in 1919 for a family of five. The place was a mess when the current owner purchased the home in 1997. A great deal of effort was made to update the look, yet restoring many original items and retaining its original brick walls, woodwork, flooring (oak in Living and pine in Bedrooms) and wavy glass windows-the foundation is an unusual combination of pier and beam with a chain wall perimeter. You will be surprised to find only one bathroom--and lots of red everywhere-different from the floral wallpaper of yesteryear!

Plan to spend the day, browse neighborhood shops, and stay for lunch or dinner at many local restaurants. Also, Anderson Fair, 2007 Grant at Welch, will be open with the opportunity to see inside this iconic music venue.

East Montrose is in the 77006 Zip Code and lies within the boundaries of Montrose, West Gray, Genesee, and Fairview. Drive or bicycle over, and look for the Home Tour signs.

East Montrose Security Initiatives

As ever, we strive to make East Montrose a safe and secure neighborhood for us all to enjoy. Here are some crime updates from the EMCA Security Committee over the last quarter, as well as new initiatives which are underway.

After three months of S.E.A.L. Security being in our neighborhood, the Security Committee is pleased to share that it has been <u>successful</u> at reducing crime! We have gathered statistics from May through July, comparing 2021 to 2022, that shows a 46% reduction year over year in all crime committed within the Greater East Montrose (GEM) boundaries. As we anticipated, employing an active security patrol deterred crime from occurring.

Since vehicular burglaries declined by 57%, we have noticed a reduction of broken glass in our streets and hope that this trend continues. While the security patrol will not be able to completely eliminate crime in our neighborhood, we are happy to report concrete statistics showing the large reduction of crime. As of now, the GEM has enough funds to cover S.E.A.L.'s contract for 80% of the year. If you have not yet joined, you can still subscribe at https://www.eastmontrose.org/news-events/security/. Please help in the efforts to continue to prevent our neighborhood from being a soft target for crimes of opportunity.

We also wanted to let our residents know that your very own EMCA members Hugo Ovalle and Pervez Agwan have been lobbying the city council and Councilwoman Kamin's office for increased pedestrian/bike safety, and newly engineered walkways throughout the neighborhood. They've been working closely with other concerned parents and residents of the NMCA (North Montrose), including Mehdi Rais, Allison Eskenov, and Kelly Turner. Together, they've formed a small coalition of Montrose residents petitioning for child and family friendly pedestrian cross-walks and walkways at:

- West Gray and Stanford Street
- · West Dallas and Stanford Street
- · Other key intersections along Columbus, Taft, and West Clay Streets

Given that there are dozens of children and families that walk over to the Wharton school, and that it is nearly impossible to cross over some of these intersections in a safe and effective manner, the East and North Montrose coalition will be meeting with TIRZ 27 at **Wharton Dual Language Academy on October 12 from 5-6PM** to detail the hazards faced by pedestrians trying to walk our neighborhoods and how we can work together to create low-cost, high-impact interventions in a timely manner. Please come out if you are able and show support for this cause.

Recipe of the Month

October means GOURDS! This month we are featuring a fan favorite, butternut squash soup! Give it a try, and let us know how yours turned out. Recipe by Cookie and Kate

Ingredients

- · I large butternut squash (about 3 pounds), halved vertically and seeds removed
- · I tablespoon olive oil, plus more for drizzling
- · ½ cup chopped shallot (about I large shallot bulb)
- · I teaspoon salt
- 4 garlic cloves, pressed or minced
- · I teaspoon maple syrup
- · 1/8 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- · Freshly ground black pepper, to taste
- 3 to 4 cups (24 to 32 ounces) vegetable broth, as needed
- · I to 2 tablespoons butter, to taste

Instructions—yields 6 servings

Preheat the oven to 425 degrees and line a rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper. Place the butternut squash on the pan and drizzle each half with olive oil (about $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon each). Rub the oil over the inside of the squash and sprinkle it with salt and pepper.

Turn the squash face down and roast until it is tender and completely cooked through, about 40 to 50 minutes (don't worry if the skin or flesh browns—that's good for flavor). Set the squash aside until it's cool enough to handle.

Instructions—yields 8 servings

Meanwhile, in a large soup pot, warm I tablespoon olive oil over medium heat until shimmering (if your blender has a soup preset, use a medium skillet to minimize dishes.) Add the chopped shallot and I teaspoon salt. Cook, stirring often, until the shallot has softened and is starting to turn golden on the edges, about 3 to 4 minutes. Add the garlic and cook until fragrant, about I minute, stirring frequently.

Transfer the contents to your stand blender

Use a large spoon to scoop the butternut squash flesh into your blender. Discard the tough skin. Add the maple syrup, nutmeg and a few twists of freshly ground black pepper to the blender. Pour in 3 cups vegetable broth, being careful not to fill the container past the maximum fill line (you can work in batches if necessary, and stir in any remaining broth later).

Securely fasten the lid. Blend on high (or select the soup preset, if available), being careful to avoid hot steam escaping from the lid. Stop once your soup is ultra creamy and warmed through.

If you would like to thin out your soup a bit more, stir in the remaining cup of broth. Add I to 2 tablespoons butter or olive oil, to taste, and blend well. Taste and stir in more salt and pepper, if necessary.

Ladle it out because it is ready to serve!
